



Ecsite Annual Conference 2012 Evaluation and Recommendations

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1. Introduction The Ecsite Annual Conference 2012

Dear Ecsite Annual Conference participants,

The Ecsite Annual Conference 2012 was held from **31 May to the 2 June in Toulouse**, **France**. The conference, hosted by the **Cité de l'Espace** had **Space and time, unlimited** as the theme. It consisted of two days of pre-conference meetings and training courses followed by three days of a main conference with **75 sessions**. The 75 programme sessions were **selected from amongst 175 proposals** that Ecsite received by October 2011. **995 delegates from 46 countries in Europe and worldwide** participated in the Ecsite AC2012.

Ecsite would like to thank all of you for your contribution to the success of this event. We are particularly grateful to the ones who took some time to give us their valuable feedback and recommendations for improvement of future conferences.

This document gives an overview of the Ecsite Annual conference 2012 as seen by its delegates.

It is a summary report drawn from the 241 conference feedback forms gathered from the delegates after the conference via an online form that was posted on the Ecsite conference website, as well as from the individual comments and from the session feedback forms gathered after every session. Due to the open questions, and individuals' comments are included in this report. Ecsite would like to thank La cité de L'Espace for its precise and hard work on the feedback forms.

These results are analysed and used by the Annual Conference Programme Committee (ACPC) and the Ecsite Executive office while speakers and convenors have received individual emails regarding their sessions. Both results (from session feedback forms and conference feedback forms) are important and are taken into consideration when the next Annual Conference is organized and the sessions are being selected.

The ACPC, the Executive Office, the Ecsite Board and the next host will carefully look at your comments to improve the most significant annual gathering of the network.

2. Overview of the evaluation of the Ecsite Annual Conference 2012

The ACPC likes to thank you for having taken the time to respond to our questions. Be assured that your feedback has been reviewed in detail and that many comments and ratings have been taken up in order to improve the quality of the Ecsite Annual Conference constantly.

As keyfindings the points with outstanding positive ratings and with the less best ratings are pointed out.

	Components	Key findings
1	Event	 The Nocturne was perceived as excellent, participants especially favored this social event. The Gala Dinner and the Farewell Party received fewer positive ratings, the ACPC will discuss what is needed to improve their format.
2	Organisation	 The on-site registration desk improved a lot compared to the 2011 conference The online registration was perceived as better than in previous years. Participants are not fully satisfied with the conference website.
4	Sessions	- The keynote speeches received excellent ratings
5	On site	- Another outstanding result was achieved by the on- site helpers - participants found them to be very pro- fessional.

3. Results

Out of the 995 participants of the conference, 241 forms were gathered (24% of the participants, exactly as many as in 2011). Results were received from an anonymous questionnaire that was put online and sent to all participants once the AC2012 ended.

3.1. Characterize the conference with three words

People gave 674 words for characterizing the conference. 97% of the words given were positive and 3% were negative (4% less negative words than 2011). The number preceding each word corresponds to the number of people who selected this word as one of their keywords.


Here are the words most often used:

3.2 Quality of the content


3.2.1 The Opening Event

The Opening Event took place in the Pierre Baudis Conference Centre and was cochaired by Mr Jean Baptiste Desbois of Cité de l'Espace and Pierre Cohen, Mayor of Toulouse, and consisted of three parts: The welcoming speech of the host and the ESA astronaut, Paolo Nespoli, and words from Ecsite representatives, Mr Robert Firmhofer and Ms Catherine Franche. In between the speeches two intervals took place featuring a local clown using juggling to illustrate principles of gravity.



3.2.2 The Closing Event


The closing event was attended by approximately 400 participants. It consisted of short speeches from Jean Baptiste Desbois, , Robert Firmhofer, as well as Camille Pisani, Chairperson of the Annual Conference Programme Committee.. What followed was a speech from Lars Rehnman, Director of Universeum in Gothenburg, Sweden, (Host of the AC2013) and a dance performance by the team of Universeum which took the audience into a dream world – referring to next year's theme: *Dreams, – the spirit of innovation*.




The rating for this event was equal to the Closing Event of 2011, which is also still more positive when compared to past years.


3.2.3 Overall quality of sessions

The delegates were asked to rate the sessions on the following aspects: relevance of topics, diversity of topics and quality of the keynote speakers. Here are their views:






Quality of keynote speeches




All three results were very well rated –especially the keynote speeches which were rated extremely well with two-thirds of respondents using the word "excellent" in their review.

3.3 Social programme


The 241 participants of our online feedback questionnaire also shared their opinion with us about the social events and the Business Bistro.




Nocturne









Newcomers breakfast




Business Bistro









Registration desk


Helpers on-site





Facilities of the conference venue






3.5 Participants' recommendations for next year's conference

3.5.1 Proposed topics for next year's conference

3.5.2 Recommendations for different aspects of the conference

The delegates were able to answer an open question about their remarks on the sessions and speakers. 78 people posted a comment – the following comments were mentioned more than twice:

Sessions

- ⇒ Sessions should be put in different categories for beginners, experts etc.
- \Rightarrow More interaction desired
- ⇒ Demand for fewer "show and tell" Power Point presentations in favour of more hands-on
- \Rightarrow More ICT and new media themes
- \Rightarrow More marketing and communication content
- ⇒ Speed dating session was very well perceived as it is a new, lively format
- ⇒ There shouldn't be more than 3 speakers for a 90 minute session, as it gets superficial if more than 3 are contributing
- ⇒ The content of the sessions should be creative, not their title > better session descriptions are needed

Speakers

- ⇒ Should upload their presentation and be better prepared (not just reading their slides)
- ⇒ English natives should speak slower
- ⇒ Speakers should use microphones
- \Rightarrow Speakers should be of both genders in one session
- \Rightarrow Speakers should not be featured in too many sessions

Organization

⇒ First-timers feel lost and want better networking opportunities because many people seem to know each other

⇒ Gala Dinner was not appropriate for 1000 people, many were served very late

 \Rightarrow Start the keynote later in the morning (participants are tired after the evening programme of the preceding day)

- ⇒ Presentations must be uploaded on the web immediately
- ⇒ Should fewer sessions be allowed? Programme is very complex
- ⇒ More seating outside the session rooms
- \Rightarrow Water should be made available all around the conference centre
- ⇒ Business Bistro was not well located, not enough interested visitors
- \Rightarrow Schedule is too tight, no time to visit science centre and town
- ⇒ Coffee should be offered ahead of the first morning session

Creative Inputs

- \Rightarrow Provide an App to exchange electronic business cards
- \Rightarrow It should be possible to download presentations via WiFi in the session rooms

⇒ Gala Dinner should be replaced with an informal networking event with movement, such as a speed dating evening

- \Rightarrow A few sessions should be held in the science centre for those who would like to see it
- ⇒ Have brokers during the breaks to bring people together, in order to facilitate improve networking
- ⇒ Put flags on the badge in order to immediately spot compatriots
